SAVE ALL WARNINGS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR FUTURE REFERENCE

The term "power tool" in the warnings refers to your mains-operated (corded) power tool or battery-operated (cordless) power tool.

1) Work Area Safety

- Keep work area clean and well lit. Cluttered or dark areas invite accidents.
- b) Do not operate power tools in explosive atmospheres, such as in the presence of flammable liquids, gases or dust. Power tools create sparks which may ignite the dust or fumes.
- c) Keep children and bystanders away while operating a power tool. Distractions can cause you to lose control.

2) Electrical Safety

- a) Power tool plugs must match the outlet. Never modify the plug in any way. Do not use any adapter plugs with earthed (grounded) power tools.
 Unmodified plugs and matching outlets will reduce risk of electric shock.
- b) Avoid body contact with earthed or grounded surfaces, such as pipes, radiators, ranges and refrigerators. There is an increased risk of electric shock if your body is earthed or grounded.
- Do not expose power tools to rain or wet conditions.
 Water entering a power tool will increase the risk of electric shock.
- d) Do not abuse the cord. Never use the cord for carrying, pulling or unplugging the power tool. Keep cord away from heat, oil, sharp edges or moving parts. Damaged or entangled cords increase the risk of electric shock.
- e) When operating a power tool outdoors, use an extension cord suitable for outdoor use. Use of a cord suitable for outdoor use reduces the risk of electric shock.
- f) If operating a power tool in a damp location is unavoidable, use a residual current device (RCD) protected supply. Use of an RCD reduces the risk of electric shock.

3) Personal Safety

- a) Stay alert, watch what you are doing and use common sense when operating a power tool. Do not use a power tool while you are tired or under the influence of drugs, alcohol or medication. A moment of inattention while operating power tools may result in serious personal injury.
- b) Use personal protective equipment. Always wear eye protection. Protective equipment such as a dust mask, non-skid safety shoes, hard hat or hearing protection used for appropriate conditions will reduce personal injuries.

- c) Prevent unintentional starting. Ensure the switch is in the off-position before connecting to power source and/or battery pack, picking up or carrying the tool. Carrying power tools with your finger on the switch or energising power tools that have the switch on invites accidents.
- d) Remove any adjusting key or wrench before turning the power tool on. A wrench or a key left attached to a rotating part of the power tool may result in personal injury.
- Do not overreach. Keep proper footing and balance at all times. This enables better control of the power tool in unexpected situations.
- f) Dress properly. Do not wear loose clothing or jewellery. Keep your hair and clothing away from moving parts. Loose clothes, jewellery or long hair can be caught in moving parts.
- g) If devices are provided for the connection of dust extraction and collection facilities, ensure these are connected and properly used. Use of dust collection can reduce dust-related hazards.
- h) Do not let familiarity gained from frequent use of tools allow you to become complacent and ignore tool safety principles. A careless action can cause severe injury within a fraction of a second.

4) Power Tool Use and Care

- a) Do not force the power tool. Use the correct power tool for your application. The correct power tool will do the job better and safer at the rate for which it was designed.
- b) **Do not use the power tool if the switch does not turn it on and off.** Any power tool that cannot be controlled with the switch is dangerous and must be repaired.
- c) Disconnect the plug from the power source and/ or remove the battery pack, if detachable, from the power tool before making any adjustments, changing accessories, or storing power tools. Such preventive safety measures reduce the risk of starting the power tool accidentally.
- d) Store idle power tools out of the reach of children and do not allow persons unfamiliar with the power tool or these instructions to operate the power tool. Power tools are dangerous in the hands of untrained users.
- e) Maintain power tools and accessories. Check for misalignment or binding of moving parts, breakage of parts and any other condition that may affect the power tool's operation. If damaged, have the power tool repaired before use. Many accidents are caused by poorly maintained power tools.
- f) Keep cutting tools sharp and clean. Properly maintained cutting tools with sharp cutting edges are less likely to bind and are easier to control.
- g) Use the power tool, accessories and tool bits etc. in accordance with these instructions, taking into account the working conditions and the work to be performed. Use of the power tool for operations different from those intended could result in a hazardous situation.

h) Keep handles and grasping surfaces dry, clean and free from oil and grease. Slippery handles and grasping surfaces do not allow for safe handling and control of the tool in unexpected situations.

5) Service

 a) Have your power tool serviced by a qualified repair person using only identical replacement parts. This will ensure that the safety of the power tool is maintained.

Safety Instructions for Reciprocating Saws

- Hold the power tool by insulated gripping surfaces, when performing an operation where the cutting accessory may contact hidden wiring or its own cord. Cutting accessory contacting a "live" wire may make exposed metal parts of the power tool "live" and could give the operator an electric shock.
- Use clamps or another practical way to secure and support the workpiece to a stable platform. Holding the workpiece by hand or against your body leaves it unstable and may lead to loss of control.

Additional Safety Instructions for Reciprocating Sabre Saws

- ALWAYS wear a dust mask. Exposure to dust particles can cause breathing difficulty and possible injury.
- Never switch on the tool when the saw blade is jammed in the workpiece or in contact with the material.
- Keep hands away from moving parts. Never place your hands near the cutting area.
- Use extra caution when cutting overhead and pay particular attention to overhead wires which may be hidden from view. Anticipate the path of falling branches and debris ahead of time.
- Do not operate this tool for long periods of time.
 Vibration caused by the operating action of this tool may cause permanent injury to fingers, hands, and arms. Use gloves to provide extra cushion, take frequent rest periods, and limit daily time of use.

Switching On and Off

- After switching off, never attempt to stop the saw blade with your fingers.
- Never put the saw down on a table or work bench unless switched off. The saw blade will keep running briefly after the tool has been switched off.

When Sawing

- When using saw blades specially designed for cutting wood remove all nails and metal objects from the workpiece before starting work.
- Wherever possible, use clamps and vices to fasten the workpiece securely.
- Do not attempt to saw extremely small workpieces.
- Do not bend too far forward. Make sure that you always stand firmly, particularly on scaffolding and ladders.
- Always hold the saw with both hands.
- For cutting curves and pockets, use an adapted saw blade.

Checking and Changing the Saw Blade

- Only use saw blades conforming to the specifications contained in these operating instructions.
- Only sharp saw blades in perfect working condition should be used; cracked or bent saw blades should be discarded and replaced at once.
- Ensure that the saw blade is securely fixed.

Residual Risks



WARNING: We recommend the use of a residual current device with a residual current rating of 30mA or less.

Electrical Safety

The electric motor has been designed for one voltage only. Always check that the power supply corresponds to the voltage on the rating plate.



Your DEWALT tool is double insulated in accordance with EN62841; therefore no earth wire is required.

If the supply cord is damaged, it must be replaced only by DEWALT or an authorised service organisation.

Mains Plug Replacement (U.K. & Ireland Only)

If a new mains plug needs to be fitted:

- Safely dispose of the old plug.
- Connect the brown lead to the live terminal in the plug.
- Connect the blue lead to the neutral terminal.



WARNING: No connection is to be made to the earth terminal.

Follow the fitting instructions supplied with good quality plugs. Recommended fuse: 13 A.

Using an Extension Cable

If an extension cable is required, use an approved 3–core extension cable suitable for the power input of this tool (see *Technical Data*). The minimum conductor size is 1.5 mm²; the maximum length is 30 m.

When using a cable reel, always unwind the cable completely.

Package Contents

- 1 Reciprocating sabre saw
- 1 General purpose saw blade

Intended Use

Your DW311 reciprocating sabre saw has been designed for professional sawing of wood, metal and tubes. The compact design permits cutting extremely close to the edge of difficult areas.

DO NOT use under wet conditions or in presence of flammable liquids or gases.

These reciprocating saws are professional power tools. **DO NOT** let children come into contact with the tool. Supervision is required when inexperienced operators use this tool.

Use appropriate blades for cutting materials as mentioned under the **Saw Blades** table.

- Young children and the infirm. This appliance is not intended for use by young children or infirm persons without supervision.
- This product is not intended for use by persons (including children) suffering from diminished physical, sensory or mental abilities; lack of experience, knowledge or skills unless they are supervised by a person responsible for their safety. Children should never be left alone with this product.

ASSEMBLY AND ADJUSTMENTS



WARNING: To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, turn tool off and disconnect tool from power source before making any adjustments or removing/installing attachments or accessories. An accidental start-up can cause injury.

Mounting the Saw Blade (Fig. B)

- 1. Open the blade clamp collar **7** to release the blade clamping mechanism.
- Insert the saw blade 8 into the holder 4 until it engages.
 The blade can be installed with the teeth pointing down or up.
- 3. Close the blade clamp collar to lock the blade clamping mechanism.

To remove the saw blade, proceed in reverse order.

A wide variety of dedicated saw blades is available as an option.



WARNING: Always select your saw blade with great care.

Setting the Adjustable Saw Shoe (Fig. C)

The saw shoe can be adjusted to limit the depth of cut and prolong the life of your saw blade.

- 1. Push the release lever 6 down.
- 2. Slide the saw shoe 5 into the desired position.
- 3. Push the lever up to secure the shoe in place.

Setting the Pendulum Stroke (Fig. D)

The adjustable pendulum stroke guarantees a perfect cutting stroke for different materials. The tool can be used in the following operating modes:



Straight reciprocating motion: for cutting metal and tubes and for finishing wood.



Orbital motion: for fast cutting of wood.

 Turn the selector 3 into the required position aligning the mark 9 with the arrow 10.

Prior to Operation

Mount the appropriate type of saw blade. Use narrow saw blades for cutting curves. Use flexible bimetal saw blades for hard-to-reach positions (e.g. close to walls, etc.).

OPERATION

Instructions for Use



WARNING: Always observe the safety instructions and applicable regulations.



WARNING: To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, turn tool off and disconnect tool from power source before making any adjustments or removing/installing attachments or accessories. An accidental start-up can cause injury.

Proper Hand Position (Fig. F)



WARNING: To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, **ALWAYS** use proper hand position as shown.



WARNING: To reduce the risk of serious personal injury, **ALWAYS** hold securely in anticipation of a sudden reaction

Proper hand position requires one hand on the side front grip **11**, with the other hand on the back handle **13**.

Switching On and Off (Fig. A)

To run the tool, press the variable speed switch **1**. The pressure exerted on the variable speed switch determines the tool speed. To stop the tool, release the switch.

Always switch off the tool when work is finished and before unplugging.

Setting the Electronic Sawing Speed (Fig. A)

The speed control dial **2** can be used for advance setting of the required range of speed.

Turn the electronic speed control dial to the required level. The required setting depends on the thickness and kind of material. Use high speeds for sawing soft materials such as wood. Use low speeds for sawing metal.



WARNING: After using the tool for an extended period on low speed settings, run it for approx. 3 minutes on maximum no-load speed.

Cutting (Fig. E, F)



WARNING: Always use eye protection. All users and bystanders must wear approved eye protection.



WARNING: Exercise extra caution when cutting towards operator. Always hold saw firmly with both hands while cutting.

Before cutting any type of material, be sure it is firmly anchored or clamped to prevent slipping. Place blade lightly against work to be cut, switch on saw motor and allow it to obtain maximum speed before applying pressure. Whenever possible, the saw shoe must be held firmly against the material being cut (Fig. F). This will prevent the saw from jumping or vibrating and minimise blade breakage. Any cuts that put pressure on the blade such as angle or scroll cuts increase potential for vibration, kickback, and blade breakage.



WARNING: Use extra caution when cutting overhead and pay particular attention to overhead wires that may be hidden from view. Anticipate the path of falling branches and debris ahead of time.



WARNING: Inspect work site for hidden gas pipes, water pipes, or electrical wires before making blind or plunge cuts. Failure to do so may result in explosion, property damage, electric shock, and/or serious personal injury.

Flush-To Cutting (Fig. F)

The compact design of the saw motor housing permits extremely close cutting to floors, corners and other difficult areas.

Pocket/Plunge Cutting – Wood Only (Fig. E)

The initial step in pocket cutting is to measure the surface area to be cut and mark clearly with a pencil, chalk or scriber. Use the appropriate blade for the application. The blade should be longer than 90 mm and should extend past the shoe and the thickness of the workpiece during the cut. Insert blade in blade clamp.

Next, tip the saw backward until the back edge of the shoe is resting on the work surface and the blade clears the work surface (position 1, Fig. E). Now switch motor on, and allow saw to come up to speed. Grip saw firmly with both hands and begin a slow, deliberate upward swing with the handle of the saw, keeping the bottom of the shoe firmly in contact with the workpiece (position 2, Fig. E). Blade will begin to feed into material. Always be sure blade is completely through material before continuing with pocket cut.

NOTE: In areas where blade visibility is limited, use the edge of the saw shoe as a guide. Lines for any given cut should be extended beyond edge of cut to be made.

Cutting Metal

When cutting thin metal always stabilize the workpiece with wood on both sides. This guarantees clean cuts and prevents damaging of the material.

For long, straight cuts draw a line on the workpiece.

Apply a thin film of lubricant along the cutting line, switch on the tool and follow the cutting line.

Cutting Plastics

Always work at reduced speed. Carry out a test cut to check whether the material is sensitive to heat.



Cutting Masonry



WARNING: When sawing asbestos cement hazardous dust may be produced. Follow the statutory guidelines and observe the recommendations issued by the asbestos cement manufacturers.

Sawing Up to a Projecting Edge (Fig. F)

Using a conventional blade installed upside down, cut up to the projected edge.

MAINTENANCE

Your power tool has been designed to operate over a long period of time with a minimum of maintenance. Continuous satisfactory operation depends upon proper tool care and regular cleaning.

Lubrication

Your power tool requires no additional lubrication.



Cleaning



WARNING: Blow dirt and dust out of the main housing with dry air as often as dirt is seen collecting in and around the air vents. Wear approved eye protection and approved dust mask when performing this procedure.
